Top Secret Diary of the Annual Meeting 2010

Have you ever wondered what happens at the YEE Annual Meeting? Are you interested in how we spent our days deep in the Moravian countryside this August? Well, you are about to find out! We are going to let you read our diary of the whole event, which will give you a detailed, day by day account of what was happening at the Annual Meeting 2010.

Arrival, Sunday 8th

On Sunday evening all the participants arrived in Josefov - Adamov, Czech Republic and more specifically at the "Švýcárna" ecological center run by Hnutí Brontosaurus (section Modry Kamen), and the Annual Meeting was officially opened.

First day, Monday 9th

On Monday morning, the participants

had the opportunity to get to know each other better and to introduce their Member Organisations with some ice-breaking and team-building games, including an environmental treasure hunting that allowed us to explore the area around Švýcárna, and learn more about the nature in this region.

In the afternoon, each delegate introduced his/her Member Organisation through games and presentations, and of course all of the participants increased their knowledge of the other MOs. This is the first important step to building tighter connections between MOs so as to make our network more effective and to ensure we cooperate together!

Second day, Tuesday 10th

After everyone got to know the other participants and MOs through lots of fun





games on Monday once the sun rose on Tuesday morning we started working seriously.

The morning session was focused on the role of the Member Organizations inside the YEE network. We pointed out together what are the opportunities, the rights and the duties of every YEE member organization, refreshing everyone's knowledge as well as learning even more about what being a member of YEE actually means.

A very concrete way for the participants to get to grips with their rights and responsibilities as members of YEE was examining the proposed changes to the Member Organisation Policy (you can read more about the changes to this and other policies and documents on pages 24-25 of this newsletter). We all divided up into small groups and discussed the policy, reflected on our role within the federation, and raised any concerns we

had about the proposed changes.

In the afternoon we got even more "real" with a session about projects. We started working on proposals of projects for the Working Plan 2011, and each participant prepared a draft project and presented it at the Project Fair. Then some of the projects were chosen for further development, and everyone selected the preparatory team to join and work in. Thanks to lots of hard work some of these projects were selected to be included in the YEE 2011 Working Plan.

This fruitful day ended with the popular Intercultural Party. Everyone had the opportunity to talk about his/her home country, we created some art pieces to describe where we come from in an interesting way and everybody had the pleasure to taste some local dishes and drinks... Well, intercultural learning includes good food too, why not?

Third day, Wednesday 11th

After the fun of the night before, Wednesday's serious sessions were about strategies.

In the morning, the participants worked on the YEE strategies: they split into small groups; they analyzed different problems and discussed how to solve



them. So, in the next months YEE will have a lot of good ideas to implement in order to improve its publications, its finances, its environmentally friendly behaviour and more.

Similar kind of work was done in the second morning session, but on a different level: this time it was about the strategies of the Member Organisations and the personal strategies of the participants for the coming year.

The afternoon activities were led by Hnutí Brontosaurus, our hosting organization for this Annual Meeting. After the demanding working groups of the morning session, the participants were definitely ready for a healthy walk in the forest around Švýcárna, a visit to one of the many caves in this area and some relaxing environmental games. Kristy was a wonderful guide!

Just after dinner we welcomed the representative of Baobaby, one of the NGOs applying to become a member of YEE. Katka gave a presentation about her organization and answered questions from the Board and the delegates. The decision about applications for membership was taken on Friday – and Baobaby is now a new Member Organisation of YEE!



Fourth day, Thursday 12th

The morning sessions were reserved for discussing and preparing the draft project plans. The Secretariat organized a really useful session about applying for grants and funding. After this the delegates split up into small groups for a simulation of applying for a grant for their project. At the end of the morning we all got together and presented our projects to

a "Funding Committee" so that their proposals could be discussed in depth and any problems ironed out. Although it was hard work and quite intense, it was a very fruitful session and we were able to see how new projects were taking shape and get them ready for inclusion in the Working Plan 2011.

After lunch, the "official" part of the Annual Meeting was opened. Lots of serious stuff took place: the voting rights of the delegates from Full Member Organisations were verified (only Full Members can vote during the Annual Meeting, although Associate Members can take part in the discussions), a Chairperson for the Meeting was elected, the Electoral Committee was selected, and two hard-working volunteers offered to take the minutes. The participants then listened to the

Annual Report about the projects carried out last year by the federation, with the participation of many of the project leaders. Then Adriana, the Secretary General, presented the Financial Report. Finally, the Chairperson Anne and the other Board Members presented their personal reports for the last year, and the Board was officially cleared of their responsibilities. We gave them a big round of applause to thank them for their hard work, and they all looked quite relieved!

Democracy is good, but following all the correct procedures can be tiring... so, at the end of the day, participants deserved some relaxation in front of a fire here in Svycarna! And trying to make a bonfire out of wet branches and damp timber was a challenging team-building exercise!





Fifth day, Friday 13th

The day started with the Secretariat report: the office team gave an account of their work during the last year.

In the morning, a representative from another organization applying for membership, EcoCenter Zapovedniks from Russia introduced their NGO to all the participants. Then the Membership Acceptance and Membership Cancellation issues were discussed. Two organisations – Baobaby from Czech Republic and EcoCenter Zapovedniks from Russia – were accepted as Associate Members. Welcome to our team!

The afternoon session (about the approval of the Statutes and the Rules of Procedure) was long and hard but very fruitful. After a couple of years of work, discussions and proposals, finally a lot of important amendments to the Statutes and Rules of Procedure were discussed and adopted. Hopefully, these changes will help the Federation to be more effective, more transparent and will bring it closer to the needs of its MOs.

The nominations for the new Executive Board Members were opened at the end of the day. The next day the representatives of Full Member Organizations had the responsibility to elect a new YEE board.

Sixth day, Saturday 14th

Another day of the official Annual Meeting. This turned out to be a long day of many discussions. Although many of us were very tired, we also realized that the discussions were very important for the future of the organisation.

We started the day with the approval of a new Working Plan for 2011. Each preparatory team had to present the project that they prepared together during the previous days, explain the aims of the project and describe it. YEE has many interesting projects to realize in the following year.

The General Assembly discussed the proposition of new policies, which are very detailed and help to regulate the work of the Federation. Furthermore,



many short-term strategies were approved so now we all have to work hard to realize our goals.

The day finished with the most exciting part – the election of a new board for 2010/2011. Candidates presented themselves, answered questions and in this way 7 new board members were elected.

Seventh day, Sunday 15th

After very intensive days of the discussion and decision-making the participants needed to find some last bits of energy for the interesting activities that had been prepared for the final day.

The new board members joined the experienced, old board for a training course – to learn how to manage the federation, which tasks to implement and how to organize work in the most effective way. They also took part in the first board meeting and already took some decisions!

The rest of participants have visited a nearby cave (the second longest system of caves in the Czech Republic, which is usually closed to the public) and the nearby steelworks museum.

Later the project teams met again to create a creative call for partners for their projects. It will help them to find partners and participants for their projects.

All participants met in the afternoon for a workshop about the YEE website. The website is designed to be very interactive and all sections are open for con-



tributions from member organisations. Participants discovered many useful tips and tools that the website offers and discovered how to co-create the website with us.

After a week of hard work, our YEE meeting finished with an important ingredient: evaluation. Participants were able to express their impressions and comments from the Annual Meeting in many ways: physically, orally and on paper. We all particularly enjoyed attaching a bit of paper to our backs and using them to write messages to other people – it was important to share nice and touching thoughts with our new friends.

At the end, we stood together one last time in a circle (our favourite shape) and connected the whole group with a string while sharing our wishes for the future with each other. It was a symbol of our network – the connection, cooperation and friendships that we hope to keep for the whole upcoming year.

O.S.BAOBABY



BAOBABY

O.S.BAOBABY is an


interest group of friends and youth associations participating in the development of environmentally friendly construction. Members of Baobaby see the potential in a gradually evolving field of natural building, which uses straw, clay, wood and scrap items as the main building materials. The main mission of O.S. Baobaby is the development and promotion of this sector in the context of sustainable development and a socially equitable and moral lifestyle.

We are trying to study the available information (books, media, internet) about this field and we also actively meet with young people who are involved in this kind of construction. However, we gain most of our experience from helping

these people construct their own buildings. Baobaby is based in the village of Hostišová in the Zlín area of Czech Republic, where we have land on which we can build our experimental facilities. So far, we have completed a small children's playhouse, a family house, an observation tower made of natural materials, as well as a playground.

Last year we held 5 weekend work-





shops, involving a total of 110 young participants. We shared basic information about natural building and participants tried out for themselves working with clay plaster (see image on the previous page). Our workshops continue! We also give presentations and this year it was our great joy to hold a course called Building with Nature, supported by Youth in Action, together with other nongovernmental organisations from the Czech and Slovak Republics - O.S. Konopa and O.S. Silezika and the student group End of Concrete. Over 9 days, 40 young people worked on the construction of a building with clay and straw using their skills in art, permaculture, renewable energy use and composting. These practical exercises complemented lectures given by Czech and Slovak experts, games, intercultural and artistics activities.

In Hostišová we also created an experimental low energy house of straw, surrounded by natural gardens, which uses rain water and solar and wind power. The house was constructed from locally sourced renewable or recycled materials, all at minimal cost and with a certain degree of improvisation! During one workshop we built a playground from mud, wood, stone and planted grass.

Participants presented the results of the course during the Composed Hostišová Festival, which provides a forum for important topics related to sustainable development through lectures, film screenings, presentations given by non-governmental organisations and businesses with an environmental focus. There is information about our activities and work on our website — **www.baobaby.org** - which is also a space for people to ask technical questions about construction and to have discussions.

Through our work in sustainable construction we have been able to reach a wide range of young people, and we continue to cooperate with many of the participants in our courses by assisting them with their own construction projects.

We also work with other non-profit environmental organizations, such as the Ecological Institute Veronica, O.S.Konopa, CZ Biom, Earthen Architecture Association, Ekodům and others, as well as with universities – in particular the Faculty of Architecture and Building from Brno and Bratislava Universities. We work with regional media, eco-minded companies and municipalities in Hostišová, and this cooperation provides us with support, inculding in the form of land. Both within and around Baobaby there is a gradual development of a community of people who want to both profesionally and personally contribute to increasing the quality of our life, and the effectiveness of our actions, in our region.

As Baobaby President Viktor Karlik

explains about our activites: "The study of natural engineering is still in its infancy and this is why it needs to develop. The basic idea is to work on creative projects and meet young people from related disciplines, which will enable future cooperation and create the conditions for the interconnected development of natural building and society towards sustainability".

We want to share information and knowledge with young people from across Europe who are looking for an organic and ecological way of life.

Environmental Education Centre "Zapovedniks", Russia

EcoCentre "Zapovedniks" is a Russian NGO that was established in 1997. The organisation's work is focused on Russia's "Zapovedniks". So, what is a "Zapovednik"?

Zapovedniks are nature reserves protected by strict regulations - "protected areas" is probably the best translation for them in English. As Natalia Dalinina, Director of the EcoCenter, explained these Zapovedniks are arguably the most traditional and most important form of natural protected area in Russia. Their existence ensures the preservation of flora and fauna in Russia, such as European bison and the last remaining areas of virgin steppe. The people who work in the Zapovedniks focus not only on the preservation of nature but also on education for local people, especially schoolchildren. (Source: Natalia Danilina, The Zapovedniks of Russia, George Wright Forum, Volume 18, No.21, 2001.)

EcoCenter Zapovedniks seeks to provide support to these Protected Areas and environmental education to the public. The organisation does this in a number of ways:

- Providing help to run environmental education activities;
- · Organising volunteer activities in the

Protected Areas:

- Organising activities aimed at ensuring the public understand the importance of the protected areas;
- Organising volunteer activities in the Protected Areas:
- Capacity building and training of specialists so that they can provide environmental education in the Protected Areas:
- Co-ordination of biodiversity conservation projects which involve a wide range of local stakeholders;
- Development of pro-biodiversity business in Protected Areas;
- Consultation work for local companies and residents;
- Seeking stronger political support for PA regionally and nationally;
- Organising workshops and training courses about environmental education:
- Publication of literature about the Protected Areas:
- Organisation of various events (exhibitions, festivals, etc.) in order to raise awareness about the Protected Areas.



I was invited as a guest to Švýcárna





New YEE official documents

During this year's Annual Meeting participants discussed a set of proposed changes to the YEE official documents: Statutes, Rules of Procedure and Policies.

The process of making changes to these official documents actually began two years ago, when it became obvious that there was a need for clearer and more detailed documents. However, it took a lot of time to prepare these changes and even though they were discussed at the 2009 Annual Meeting, still more corrections and clarifications were needed to



make these key documents clear, correct and useful. The old set of official documents were created in 2004 and since then we have discovered that some things are nor clearly explained, that others do not match the changing times and that other things were even contradictory.

To facilitate the process of discussing new changes the board divided the changes into the following themes: formal changes, division of tasks, physical and virtual board meetings, age, working plan, Associate and Full Member Organisations, Board and Secretary General, Assistant Officers, international secretary meeting, voting and dates of the Annual Meeting.

As Anne Kollien, the previous YEE Chairperson wrote in her email to Member Organisations before the meeting: "WHY all this? The proposals for changes that you receive this year are based on those that were made by the board of the previous year. In summary, we are trying to approve a new structure and version of the Statutes and Rules of Procedure that does not have to be discussed again year after year but will serve us for a longer time. The old one has - at least to some extent - become obsolete and at the present time there are several contradictions



between the YEE official documents. We really would like to solve these problems before our next business year!"

Anne Kollien dedicated lots of time to explaining the changes to all the delegates at the Annual Meeting – this was particularly helpful since she had been working on the changes during her time as YEE Chairperson and understood them inside and out. The participants in the Annual Meeting then discussed the changes, analysed them, asked for clarifications, and suggested corrections. The new official documents were then approved by the General Assembly (the General Assembly consists of the representatives of the Full Member Organisations attending the

Annual Meeting). If no Full Member Organisations oppose the changes in writing, then these will become the new YEE official documents.

These documents have been sent to all Member Organisations by email and you can also download them from our website. If you are not sure how something works within YEE, if you would like to understand better your role as a Member Organisation or you would like an explanation of terms like Annual Meeting or General Assembly then we recommend you take a look at these important documents.

Youth and Environment Europe (YEE) Working Plan 2010 - 2011

Adopted by the General Assembly, in Josefov-Adamov, Czech Republic, August 14th 2010

Projects and Activities

Projects and activities of YEE for the executive year 2010-2011 will include a number of training courses, trainings for trainers, youth exchanges, seminars, networking projects, campaigns, local activities and annual events. YEE will continue to produce publications and the website will be updated and improved. During the previous years YEE has used "youth" and "environment" areas for funding and for setting up activities and will continue to apply for such funds for the activities in this Working Plan. Hopefully all activities will be implemented.



Training Courses

• Sustainable Tourism

(August 2011, Ohrid - Macedonia)

A training course which goal will be to define the role of NGOs in promotion of sustainable use of touristic potential in EU and non-EU countries (lakes, national parks, protected areas).

• I can lead! I can facilitate!

(July 2011, Czech Republic)

The training course 'I can lead! I can facilitate!' is projected for young people who are leaders, coordinators, youth workers in their organisations and want to improve their skills in leading projects, actions, managing groups. It will focus especially on young people working in the field of environmental protection.

Seminars

• European environmental law and youth participation

(Brussels or Strasbourg)

The aim of the seminar is to get to know European environmental law, raise awareness on youth participation in decisionmaking process and share best practices.

Youth Exchanges

• Waste Management and Renewable Energies

(June 2011, Portugal)

A youth exchange for young people to share experience on environmental management issues (waste management and recycling), ways of usage of renewable energy sources.

• Biodiversity – Let's go to the roots (July 2011, Armenia)

Youth exchange dedicated to awareness raising activities about biodiversity, information exchange and sharing of experience over current issues of conversion and wise use of wetlands and wetland biodiversity, endemic species of plants.

• Learning from each other – methods of environmental education

(April 2011, Czech Republic)

The Youth Exchange will present the best practices that youth environmental organisations use in their work with youth (for example: environmental and educative games, workshops, various outdoor activities) – all connected with methods of environmental education.

Networking Projects

• Environment and volunteerism / Together for environment (Partnership Building Activity - PBA)

(Late spring 2011, Armenia)

This PBA will connect youth organizations interested and working on environmental issues from European Union and Eastern European/Caucasian countries to discuss current environmental issues and the good practices of their organizations, to develop partnerships and to create new environmental joint projects.

• YEE Day

(One day in 2011, in each country of MOs)

By celebrating the YEE day we would like to strengthen networking and the feeling of being part of the YEE network as well as promote YEE. The idea is to organize the same action in each country and exchange experience.



Campaigns

• Schools go for green Europe (August 2011-July 2012)

The main aim of the project is to raise awareness of sustainable lifestyle in Europe. It will be achieved by eco campaign at primary and secondary schools with diverse eco activities in international context involving children and youth to take care over European nature and their living environment.

• Caring for the future? Caring for the forest!

(July-December 2011)

As year 2011 is declared by the UN the International Year of Forests, the main goal of this international information and education campaign is raising awareness about the importance of caring for the forest. By this campaign we aim to enhance knowledge and understanding of the role, impact and many benefits that forests have and bring into everyday life.

• Sunny Campaign

(web page update and upgrade)

The project will focus on updating the Sunny Campaign webpage with inputs from different countries of Europe with help of volunteers. Topics to cover: local, organic food, eco-clothes, housing, energy.


